



"Resilience. This is a word I've heard people use to define me. When I retrace the steps along the broken paths that got me here, I understand why. The family that I grew up in is broken. Becoming estranged to my family is a pain that I struggle with to this very day but I still go back. I



go back to see the smiles on not so little faces when their big sister comes home, even though their idea of my home has long been different from mine. My home today is with my fiancé and friends who stand by me. My whole world once burned to the ground. But from the ashes, I was able to build the person that I am today. I am a young person struggling with anxiety and depression. I am a survivor of abuse. But who I am, truly and most importantly is a strong individual who strives to be better with each passing day.

I joined this network as a former youth in care, as a young person who has wanted to change the world since I've been in diapers. I call my process the Phoenix Process-I create something beautiful from the ashes of negative situations. I have beaten every odd against me and come out better than ever. I want to give young people the tools that they need to do the same for them. As a member of the NBYICN and a youth care worker, I want to build a safer way for young people to identify, and create their own process, so that they too can defeat the odds.

Resilience may be how you choose to define me, but I am simply surviving, empowering my voice by sharing it with others to make a difference. I am Samantha Neil, an advocate passionate about changing the world and helping others realize that they can do the same. "

Spring & Summer 2015 in review—

Community Presentations on Fostering & Adoption

Starting in March 2015, the NBYICN began collaborating with the Fredericton office of the Department of Social Development to create a community presentation about fostering and adopting youth from care. These presentations were designed to recruit foster and adoptive families in the Fredericton region. We've had great turnouts so far, and spoken to lots of interested foster and adoptive parents. As you can imagine, we've brought our NBYICN real talk to these presentations! We've shared advice for foster and adoptive families, told our stories, and emphasized the importance of permanency and family for youth in care.

The 2015 Provincial Summit for New Brunswick Youth in Care

On Friday November 27th, over 100 youth in care, and supportive adults gathered in Fredericton for the 1st ever Provincial Summit for Youth in Care! We had folks from Bathurst, the Acadian Penninsula, the Eispogtog First Nation, Fredericton, Sussex, Woodstock, St. Stephen, Edmundston, Saint John, Miramichi, the Kingsclear First Nation, and the Tobique First Nation. We even had the Minister of Social Development, the Honourable Minister Cathy Rogers, in attendance!

The event offered youth in care the opportunity to voice their thoughts and needs about the care system in New Brunswick. They participated in structured discussions that allowed them to name and describe their main concerns with the care system. And name them they did—concerns about group homes, foster families, garbage bags, rules, curfews, requisitions, social workers, and a lack of connections and opportunities.



Halfway through the day, the youth in attendance were asked to decide which of the issues raised were most important. The top 5 issues selected by the youth in attendance were:

- 1. Wanting to rebuild and keep relationships with their **biological families and siblings.**
- 2. "Foster Families are too strict and have too many rules."
- 3. **Lack of training** for Foster Parents, Group Home Staff, and Social Workers on the complex issues that youth in care face.
- 4. Youth in Care want to be **treated the same** as biological kids in foster homes.
- 5."We are often **not ready** to leave the system when we age out."

In the afternoon, the youth and adults in attendance worked together to come up with solutions to address these issues. And they are great solutions! At this very moment, hard-working leaders and members of the NBYICN are working to create a report that summarizes these solutions, as well as the entire event's discussions.





























Children and Youth in Care Day 2015

November 29th was the 2nd annual Children and Youth in Care Day in New Brunswick!

November 29th, 2014 marked the official declaration of **Children and Youth in Care Day in New Brunswick!** The Honourable Minister of Social Development Cathy Rogers issued an official declaration, making New Brunswick one of only a few Canadian provinces to take this important step. On November 29th 2015, Children and Youth in Care Day celebrations were hosted in communities throughout New Brunswick. There were celebrations in Fredericton, Woodstock, Moncton, Saint John, Miramichi, Edmundston, Campbellton, Tracadie-Sheila, and Bathurst!



Our initial counts have told us that this year approximately **200** youth in and from care were able to take part in these celebrations! As there are many more youth in care in New Brunswick, we look forward to celebrating with more youth in November 2016! Each region's celebrations were different some went bowling, some did crafts, some listened to quest speakers, some went out for dinner, some played hockey, and some even busted a move at their own YouTube dance party!



But none of this would have been possible without the tireless support and encouragement of social workers, supervisors, group home staff, and foster parents across New Brunswick! We are so very grateful for all the time and energy that you put into planning and coordinating these events! We look forward to continuing to work together in the coming year! We hope that this tradition will continue next year on November 29th!
